State Representative proposes new bill for Pelahatchie

Currently, the Mississippi Department of Revenue resides in Clinton, Miss. in an old warehouse off of Springridge Road that was originally the site of Entergy. At the time, the location in Clinton was supposed to be only a temporary residence; however, 15 years later, the Department of Revenue has not moved.

The warehouse in Clinton has had maintenance issues, and it has come to the attention of legislators the move to a new location may be needed. Last session, the state Senate approved the move from the current Clinton location to the Landmark building located in downtown Jackson, Miss. However, the proposal was stopped at the House

of Representatives and never made it out of committee.

For this new session, State Representative Tom Miles is going to make a new proposal for the Department of Revenue to make its home in Pelahatchie, Miss. Over the summer, Rep. Miles spoke with local Pelahatchie leaders and discussed the idea of where to put the potential new building. As plans go, Miles is proposing to construct a new one-story building for the Department of Revenue behind the Chevron gas station off the Interstate 20 exit.

"We want to give a different alternative site, and I believe Pelahatchie would be a great place to put the Department of Revenue," said

Rep. Tom Miles. "There are so many advantages to having it there."

Miles says that the Department of Revenue would benefit greatly from the move because the building would have the opportunity to expand and add on if needed because there is space and the ability to grow. Also, the plot of land would be close to Interstate 20, which would provide easy access to and from the building. Traffic congestion would not be a problem, and the Department of Revenue would be in a central location right in the middle of the state.

"Not only would this be a better place for the department, it would also help boost the Pelahatchie economy," said Miles.

At this time, over 600 people are employed by the Department of Revenue. Miles says that this would mean more people being driven to come to Pelahatchie; and, also, more people would be buying products in Pelahatchie. With the department employing so many people, the opportunity for Pelahatchie residents to apply for these jobs would be a significant benefit to the community.

"We are going to fight for this proposal, and our plan is to put Pelahatchie's name on the map," said Miles. "This is going to be a heated subject, but we are going to push for it."

A brief update on current projects: Our Milltown Park project is very close to getting started.

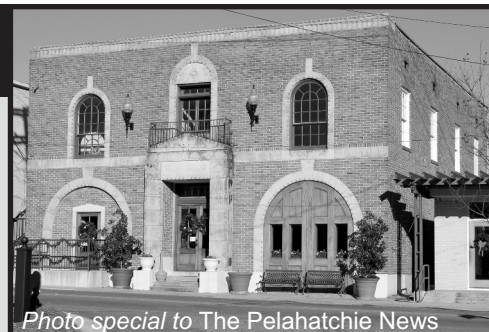

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Legislature prepares for new session

A new year. A new session. A new set of issues — and a whole lot of old ones as well.

Several issues from the 2012 session will return again, such as: charter schools, plugging budget holes and making sure our health care system is sound. However, we are also going to face new challenges like Medicaid expansion, mental health issues and school safety.

With the recent tragedy in Newtown, Conn., everyone is focused on school safety and mental health care. I have already requested a bill be drafted that will bring together people from law enforcement, education, mental health, churches and local government to look at a comprehensive school safety plan. We know that different dis-

tricts have different needs, but we still need to make sure that every school is meeting a certain standard of safety. I believe the best way to find out what that standard will be is to involve the people who deal with our schools and public safety every day. I hope we will take their recommendations and move forward with plans to create a statewide standard of safety for our schools; and, hopefully, this will still allow individual districts to take additional precautions where needed.

We will also have to look at Mississippi's mental health care industry. It is important that we continue to fund our community mental health facilities. It is also important that we evaluate the Mississippi Department of Mental Health to make sure we are using the best approaches to treating mental illness in Mississippi. I have heard many concerns about reaching into our schools and equipping them with the resources they need to address students with mental illness. This will be a priority as well.

Education will be the biggest focus for us. Charter schools will come before us again, and I will continue to fight for a bill that will do no harm to our public schools that are working hard to provide quality education to our students. I will vote for anything that will benefit our students as long as it does not leave our public schools and children in shambles.

Health care will be another area where we are likely to see big debate. While Medicaid funding is always an important issue, this year it will be more important with the decision over expanding Medicaid. This is going to be a tough issue, and I am concerned about how we will pay for this program. My biggest concern is our local hospitals. If the federal government takes away their funding that they depend on to survive, Mississippi may be left with no choice but to expand Medicaid, or our hospitals will go bankrupt. I will work closely with our local medical community on this issue and will do everything I can to keep you in-

formed as we learn more about how all of this will work.

The good news is that our economy has improved slightly over the past year; so, our budgeting should not be as painful as in years past. This does not mean we will spend like crazy. We will still look for places where we can save money and keep government lean. At the same time, I hope we can restore some funding to key agencies that have been cut during the recession.

I want to share an important bill before I close. The first is Erin's Law. I have joined with Senator Nancy Collins to push for a bipartisan bill that would educate our children and teachers about child abuse. Our children need to know that it is okay to tell when they are or someone they know is being abused. We must protect our children from sexual predators.

December was a busy ending to the 2012 year with 85 total calls between four fire departments in the Delta district: Leesburg-18 calls, Lake Harbor-11 calls, Pelahatchie-30 calls and Walters-26 calls.

This year was filled with many trials, hardships, successes, disappointments and accomplishments that each fire department had to face, and the above mentioned four fire departments have a lot of memories and stories to tell. 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The economy: same song different verse

Economic forecasting is getting boring. I am sure that comes as a shock, so let me explain. It seems lately that the forecast is always for modest growth. The national economy grew an estimated 2.0 to 2.2 percent in 2012. This is not a lot different from the 1.8 percent observed in 2011, or the 1.9 percent projected for 2013. Facing global competition and strug-

seen since 2007. If housing and vehicle sales continue to improve, the recovery will at least be on firmer footing.

Although not necessarily the kind we desire, we have had a bit more drama in Mississippi. The state saw a significant decline in employment during the middle of the year. We are adding jobs now, but with these declines, we have estimated that the state's economy only grew a meager 0.5 per-



gling with enormous debt, the United States has entered an era of slow growth that is going to be with us for a long time. We do not expect a growth rate above 3.0 percent until 2015. It will be longer still before we see the historical expansion average of 3.8 percent.

There is a little excitement in the housing sector. Housing starts and prices are rising; builder confidence is the best it has been in years. Even though the industry is finally on the mend, we have a long way to go before we are building houses at the level we were before the recession. Another bright spot is that vehicle sales topped 14 million units in 2012. This is the most we have

cent in 2012. Growth is expected to improve in 2013 to an estimated 1.0 percent. Historically speaking, this is still a fairly tame growth rate, but it is stronger than either the years of 2011 or 2012.

Assuming we avoid the fiscal cliff, the nation should manage to steer clear of a recession in 2013. As already stated, slow growth is the new normal. The high debt levels and the government's penchant for spending will dampen growth for the foreseeable future.

The increased regulatory environment brought on by the financial reform and health care legislation will also diminish growth. Since slow growth beats no growth or negative growth, I guess boring can be good.

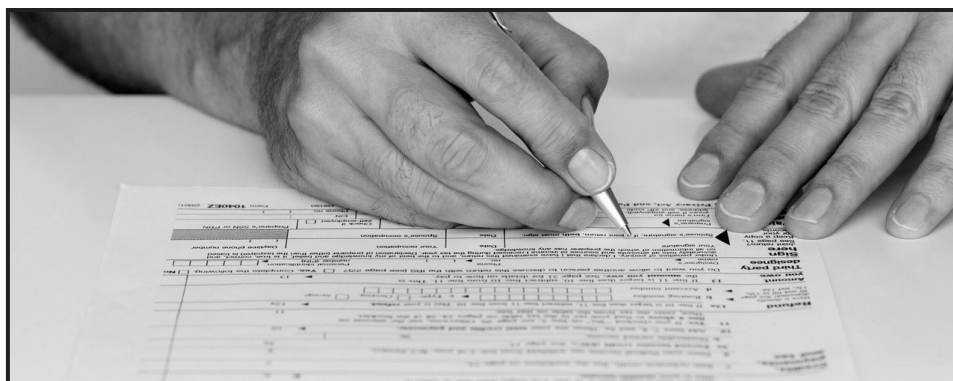

There were four hymns that were sung at Elvis's funeral. Anybody know what they were? 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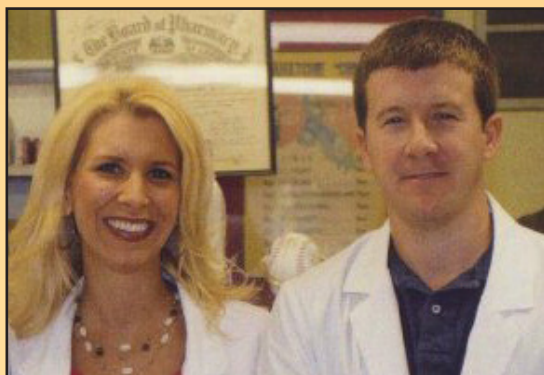
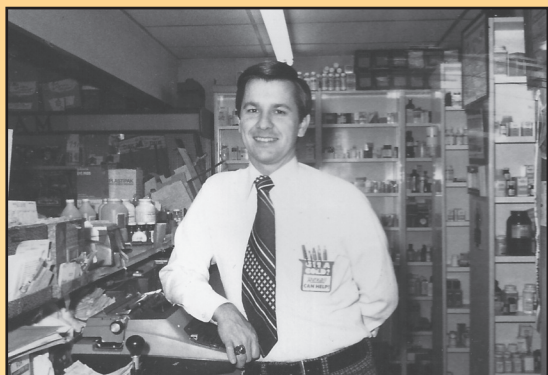
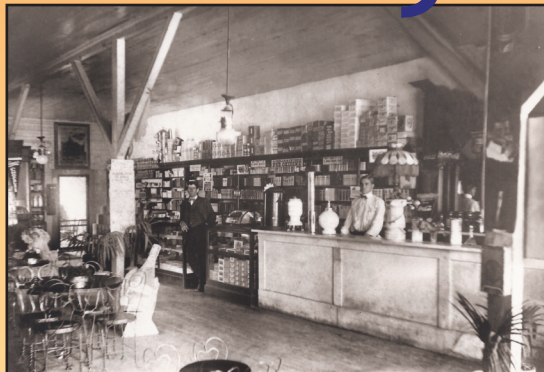
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
